

MILESTONE

The Socio-Cognitive Laboratory,

Franziska Köder, Lab manager

18 active lab projects, 2022: 1400 hours of lab use and 400 participants, 2023: 2230 hours in the lab



- New methods: EEG, eye-tracking, pupillometry, behavioral tests, cognitive and linguistic assessment, interviews, focus groups, etc.
 Participants: from 5 months-old infants to elderly people
- **Eye Hub** (2022-2024): UiO-wide network for eyetracking and pupillometry, members: 78 from different faculties and departments
- HumanLab plans for a new joint lab with RITMO (CoE)



Commissions and societal impact

Pia Lane was appointed to Norway's Truth and Reconciliation Commission to investigate injustices against the Sámi and Kven populations in Norway. The report was submitted to the Norwegian Parliament in June 2023.
